- Impact police, cottagers, cottagers' associations and insurance companies
- First Watch started in 1993 in South Porcupine

Cottage Watch History

- The Cottage Watch program incorporates
 - property identification,
 - community patrols,
 - break and enter investigations (OPP)
- These are all brought together through effective partnerships within the cottage community.

- FOCA and the OPP agreed upon a partnership to develop a provincial Cottage Watch network to support all cottagers' associations.
- The Solicitor General and Minister of Correctional Services recognized FOCA and the program when announcing the provincial initiative, to reduce the victimization of break and enters.

Current Status

- In early summer 2009, OPP and F.O.C.A. renewed the commitment to sustain and revitalize the Cottage Watch Program
- Currently reviewing and updating the program (*e.g. decals and materials*)

Objectives

The Objectives of Cottage Watch are to:

- Involve cottage associations in self-help crime prevention and fire safety.
- Organize cottage association members into effective cottage watch groups.
- Improve communications between seasonal property owners, the OPP and other policing authorities.

Objectives continued...

- Reduce the incidence of theft, damage, and break-ins.
- Assist police in crime prevention and detection.
- Promote fire safety for rural properties, and the use of smoke detectors and carbon monoxide detectors in cottage properties.
- Promote the use of engravers and property identification measures to help solve crimes.
- Publicize the program and its successes.

- Participate in Cottage Watch



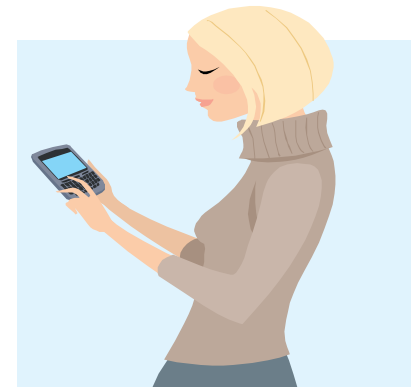

Report Suspicious Activity

- Call police
- Identify yourself
- Give the exact location of the crime or activity

When to call 9-1-1

- If someone is hurt and needs medical assistance.
- A **CRIME IN PROGRESS**: for example someone is taking or damaging property that does not belong to them.
- If you see someone hurting someone else.
- If you see a fire or smell smoke.

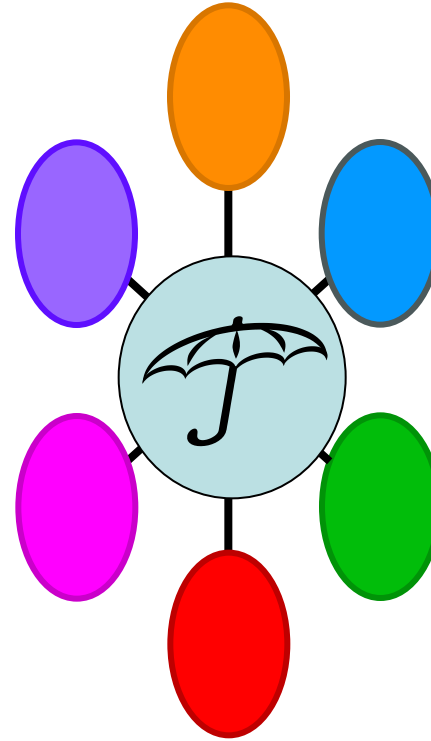
