


Population Trends




FIGURE 1. YEAR-OVER-YEAR PERCENTAGE EMPLOYMENT GROWTH: JUNE 2020




How many private roads are there in Ontario?


Just one example:







Top Road-related Issue(s) for your association?



Among FOCA's 525 Member Associations in 2022, how many report they manage private roads?




Size of the Road Associations:




Does your road group have/use the following?

Does the road association carry liability insurance?





Snow Clearing: How?

- "Those who use the road in the winter (even once counts!) pay into a separate fund for winter plowing."
- "Association pays a contractor, under a fixed seasonal contract."
- "Municipality clears the road."
- "Snow clearing is done by volunteers."


"The association chipped in a bit for the first time this winter."



(92 of 148 responses)


most common road width reported:

Is your rural road in compliance with the standards for emergency vehicles in your area?

e.g., corridor width and height required by municipal/county fire services





Annual Road Fees charged ranged from:

\$50 - \$1,700

(148 responding Associations of various road lengths)

2/3 of groups charge everyone the same fee, regardless usage

106 of 148 responses received.

Note: half of these are seasonal-only roads.

Among groups where "everyone pays the same":

Average Annual Fee = \$255

(n=98, excludes the 4 highest & 4 lowest responses)





"Road is in better condition due to ongoing maintenance."




"Full road repair had not been done regularly and several new builds were completed which added extra use of the road."



For the most part, road repair and maintenance work is done by:



Township of South Frontenac Receives Innovation Award for Private Lane Upgrades


Toronto, Ontario, August 17, 2020 – The Peter J. Marshall Innovation Award Jury presented a Certificate of Merit to the Township of South Frontenac for its innovative approach to helping residents upgrade private lanes to improve access. The certificate was presented at the 2020 AMO Conference, held online.

South Frontenac provides residents with a 50% subsidy, up to a maximum of \$7,000, to upgrade private laneways. This helps improve access for emergency vehicles for improved public safety. Established in 2007, it is unique in Ontario in that it goes beyond simple maintenance to address capital improvements.

South Frontenac received 2020 AMO award for Private Lane Upgrade Assistance Project (ongoing)

DRINKING WATER



What needs to happen to protect everyone's drinking water in Ontario?

ONTARIO'S DRINKING WATER protection framework has correctly been lauded as exceptional. However, improved implementation and sustained investment is needed now to extend protection beyond municipal systems and ensure safe drinking water for all.

The legacy of events in Walkerton, Ontario that occurred in May 2000 has resulted in a significantly improved legal framework for drinking water protection that includes a multi-barrier property. At the 20th proping represent the 18 per cent of Ontario's population that is not currently covered by existing source protection plans.

People who draw drinking water from domestic wells in villages, hamlets, and towns that lack municipal drinking water systems do not currently have any legally enforceable safeguards under approved source protection plans. For example, the Auditor General of Ontario reported that approximately 16 million Outgrings was private walls.

The Ontario Ministry of the Environment, Conservation and Parks has decided not to utilize these powers, thus leaving these communities unprotected by the multi-barrier approach that Justice O'Connor recommended.

What happened after Walkerton?




Lake Partner Program water quality data





Septic Re-inspection Programs in Ontario

A FOCA Report for Community Groups (2019)

Ontario has 250,000 rural waterfront properties, and most rely on on-site wastewater treatment systems—also known as sewage systems or septic systems—to manage their household wastewater. FOCA initiated a project with partners to explore successes, challenges & lessons learned from existing municipal septic re-inspection programs across Ontario.


Class of Sewage Systems: among a set of 1,000 re-inspections in 2018


